Tarmac very kindly donated two loads of road planings from the A48 and these have now been spread over the overflow car park at the Village Hall by the generous help of Bob Hyslop and green tractor.



The result is just superb. With various well attended events coming up, we will be making good use of the extra parking that this provides.

The next step is then the top coat tarmac for Ellis Bank and the Village Hall entrance. Unfortunately this was held up by problems in the drains on the A48, such that surface rainwater could not escape - and hence the traffic lights on the A48 on 15<sup>th</sup> + 16<sup>th</sup> November. Once the drains have been sorted we hope that the top coat will be applied well before Christmas.

### **Minsterworth Footpaths**

We are extremely fortunate to have a wealth of lovely footpaths in our village. These can be seen on:

Foot paths should be a two way agreement however. Although we are permitted a legal right to walk on the footpath, we also have a legal obligation to respect the rights of the land owner, his crops and livestock. This came into focus recently when unfortunately a dog was reported to be chasing cattle. Please remember that if the dog cannot be controlled in such instances, then the livestock owner has the right to shoot the dog to protect his livestock. This has happened at least once in the past in Minsterworth when dogs were attacking sheep.

Please keep to the footpath and keep your dog under control at all times, but especially in fields with livestock. Please also clean up after your dog. Dogs carry parasites that can cause blindness in children (Toxocara), an incurable brain disease in sheep and cattle (gid = tapeworm cysts) and abortion in cattle (Neospora) The risk of Toxocara and tapeworm (C ovis) can be reduced by regular worming, and although not a legal requirement, we would ask that all dog walkers PLEASE ensure that their dogs are regularly and suitably wormed.

If you find that the footpath is poorly marked, then please report this to PROW using the above web site, as further signs can be erected.

And at the end of all that, and equally as important, please enjoy your walks!



To hear the last post and the exhortation that was read out in Church by Terry Bourne and then again at the placing of the poppy wreaths at the war memorial was poignant and brought home to us all, that yes, they did give their tomorrows for our todays and we should remember them.

### HISTORICAL SNIPPETS AROUND MINSTERWORTH



If, in Minsterworth, back in the mid-to-late 1700's, you could read and had the money to buy it, you would have got your news from the Glocefter Journal weekly newspaper. Published by the eminent Gloucester printer and philanthropist Robert Raikes from his premises in Southgate Street (now the beautifully restored timber-framed Robert Raikes Inn). The Journal provided news from all around Gloucestershire and neighbouring counties and also Wales. I have recently come by an original, very fragile, copy of the paper dating from 16th April 1674 and very interesting reading it makes too.

Minsterworth people would particularly have noted on page two the reported existence of a 'new turnpike road leading from Glocester, through Newnham, Lydney and Chepstow to Abergavenny and other parts of Wales, which is by far the beft and neareft Road to all those Plafes; and there are good Houfes all the way, where Gentlemen and Ladies may depend on meeting with the beft Accommodations' (this road replaced the first turnpike road through Minsterworth created in 1726).

Horse-drawn carriage or coach was the main form of transport and elsewhere in the paper is an advertisement for the 'Glocester Flying Stage-Coach' which left Fleet Street London for Gloucester every Sunday, Tuesday and Friday night at 10pm and reached Gloucester by 7 o'clock the following evening. The Coach made the return journey from Gloucester to London leaving Gloucester at 10 o'clock every Sunday, Wednesday and Friday night.

On a less pleasant note the reader would have noted an ad. For a 'Subscription Cock-Match' to be fought at Andoversford, involving 31 cocks on each side, the prize being 2 Guineas a battle. On the same page was a report that one Daniel was executed at Gloucester for stealing 4 cows. It reports that, on mounting the scaffold, 'his deportment was fuitable to his melancholy fituation'.

Resurfacing of the A48 has been completed.

Unfortunately it is clear that Gigaclear have 'a problem' with a huge backlog of broadband installations. There is no news on when Minsterworth's fibre will happen. TBC's JCS is out for consultation.

#### Public comment

There was a query about Minsterworth Garage's change of use.

### Planning

18/01001/FUL Thatchers Farm change of use to equestrian. Concern about effluent runoff.

18/01024/FUL Parcel 0020 erection of 2 infill dwellings with vehicular access. Concern about sufficient turning space. Not in keeping with existing properties. Height etc. Chimney looks low with bungalow so close. Objection to current plan,

18/01023/FUL still using same plan so could overlook existing dwelling. Refer to previous letter objecting.

18/0102/FUL Now still 4 bed but same footprint. Support

18/01085/FUL Essentially gated community. Not compatible with current street scene as suggests 'not safe' therefore object. Was pond on original application?

18/01083/FUL concern over setting a precedent by agreeing to 3rd storey – beside a bungalow. Also talk of becoming a gated community. Against - out of character with street scene

Late application - next to Rosemary Cottage 2015 Calcotts Green 2015. Now up to 6 bedrooms (already agreed). Surface water? Support.

Late application – Lyncroft Support 18/00663 & 00666 Highcross Farm granted Greenacres going to committee
